CANADASWOT Analysis

STRENGTHS	Existence of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, which has constitutional status and is fundamental in court decisions regarding the protection of freedom of expression, opinion, and the press; Strong institutional framework of division of powers with an independent Judiciary; Associations advocating freedom of expression and freedom to practice journalism that mobilize in defense of these causes.
WEAKNESSES	Concentration of media conglomerates and weakening of independent media in provinces, regions, and smaller cities; Dominant position of digital platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, TikTok, Instagram, Google and others among younger audiences, who mostly get news on social media; Emergence of ideological and political trends that promote disinformation and propaganda in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Russia-Ukraine conflict, and the economic crisis; Political correctness having the effect of self-censorship and censorship in certain media outlets, including the public corporation CBC and websites such as <i>The Conversation</i> .
OPPORTUNITIES	Passing of pieces of legislation (Bills C-10 and C-11) regulating large digital platforms (Meta, Netflix, Google) to promote Canadian content and support independent media; Expanded media access for voices representing traditionally marginalized communities, such as Canada's aboriginal peoples and immigrant groups; Lobbying of journalists' and media trade organizations for greater transparency in government and federal organization communications; Promotion of new forms of journalistic entrepreneurship based on digital platforms; Development of data journalism to present issues such as climate change and pandemics in a way accessible to the public.

Increased political and social polarization in some provinces where certain political movements spread conspiracy theories accusing journalists and the media of promoting social control; Violent attacks and threats against journalists amid coverage of the COVID-19 pandemic set precedent that could point to a trend of clashes with the media in the medium term.
